Wading Bird Rookeries of the Cedar Keys NWR


The islands of the Cedar Keys National Wildlife Refuge have been important nesting grounds for many species of wading and shorebirds for a long time. The Refuge was established in 1929 due to its critical importance in providing nesting grounds. In this presentation, Doig will discuss the current

state of nesting activities on Snake Key, give an update on Seahorse Key activity, and also give an overview of the artificial nesting platform for shorebirds and seabirds at Atsena Otie Key.

#### **Cedar Key Bird Rescue Program**

From Doug Maple: On March 1st I received a call of an injured dove at the residence of Betty Rose Cook at the corner of Hwy 24 and 5th St. The bird had been hit by a car. I took it to my residence for closer examination and a larger cage. The bird was a fledgling Eurasian collared dove. He became more active as the day went on and ate and drank very well. On Saturday March 3, I closely examined him for injuries and after finding none I released the bird on Sunset Point Dr. He easily flew away.





Six more people were trained in rescue procedures in the Town of Suwannee and there were two pelican rescues and releases. Here is Johnny Arellano with a rescued brown pelican.

If anyone has rescue reports or photos to submit - please send them! Even when the rescue was "unsuccessful" (e.g., if you went looking for a bird but could not find it or could not catch it), we need to keep track. A text, email, or phone call (804-305-6014) to Dr. Barry with the info about the rescue would suffice if the paper form is too inconvenient. She needs the species, type of injury, volunteers that helped, approximate amount of time spent (including transport to rehab, if any), and outcome of rescue (if known). Even if you cannot remember all details, please send anything you can remember about rescue activities. Photos are also essential to the record keeping.

Numbers to call for rescue are at the end of this newsletter and are on each page of the website.

#### Cedar Key's Old Florida Celebration of the Arts Street Festival

Participating in International Migratory Bird Day, we have once again partnered with local school students to create a stunning display of wildlife paintings and drawings, representing local birds. With the guidance and inspiration of the dynamic new teacher, Paula Willis, CKA has received over twice as many entries as last year, reaching over 150 pieces of art to hang in the Audubon booth during the Old Florida Celebration of the Arts on March 24 and 25.

Please come by our booth to see these creative renderings by students from both the Cedar Key School and the Yankeetown School. We should all be very proud of these young artists.

In addition to the students' wildlife artwork, festival attendees may also enjoy an exhibit of live wild birds in the booth, with knowledgeable avian handlers standing by to answer questions. While there, pick up some cards to distribute to dining establishments asking them to only provide plastic straws when requested as we work to reduce the amount of plastic that goes into our oceans. We will also have metal straws available at the booth.

#### **Banded America Oystercatcher (AMOY) Sighting**

Incidental to another seasonal AMOY roost survey on the upper gulf, Doris and Pat Leary re-sighted DG[B12] at the airport offshore rake on Saturday February 17. For four consecutive days, they contended with heavy sea fog at Cedar Key and that Saturday's conditions were the most challenging. The morning fog did not recede until after noon and only for a brief period before rushing back to shore much denser and with brisk winds! In the brief period of clear sky, they were only able to visit three sites, and re-sighted this bird in that tight window.

# Citizen Science Opportunities:

#### **Jay Watch**

The <u>Florida Scrub-Jay</u> is our state's only endemic bird species. The state's population of Florida Scrub-Jays is estimated to have declined by 90% since the early 1800s. Between 1993 and 2010 our state's Scrub-Jay population declined another 26%. Currently it is mostly found on public lands where they are generally better protected. The Cedar Key Scrub Reserve was set aside for their protection, but are any still here?

#### What's at Stake - Funding for Sea Grant

Florida Sea Grant is a university-based program that supports research, education, and extension to conserve coastal resources and enhance economic opportunities for the people of Florida. It is a partnership between the Florida Board of Education, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, and Florida's citizens and governments. The extension, education and outreach programs are done in partnership with UF/IFAS Extension and coastal counties of Florida. This program is vital to our area since its four main focus areas are: Healthy coastal environments; sustainable fisheries; resilient communities; and environmental literacy and workforce development.
