If anyone has rescue reports or photos to submit - please send them! <u>Even</u> when the rescue was "unsuccessful" (e.g., if you went looking for a bird but could not find it or could not catch it), we need to keep track. A text, email, or phone call (804-305-6014) to Dr. Barry with the info about the rescue would suffice if the paper form is too inconvenient. She needs the species, type of injury, volunteers that helped, approximate amount of time spent (including transport to rehab, if any), and outcome of rescue (if known). Even if you cannot remember all details, please send anything you can remember about rescue activities. Photos are also essential to the record keeping.

Our Newest Project - No More Plastic Straws

We use 500 million plastic straws everyday in the United States. If we don't act now, by 2050 there will be more plastic than fish in our oceans. An estimated 71% of seabirds and 30% of turtles have been found with plastics in their stomachs. When they ingest plastic, marine life has a 50% mortality rate. What would our oceans be without marine life? At the very least, say "NO PLASTIC STRAW, PLEASE!" Get in the habit of asking for no straw when you order a beverage. Be ready to tell your server why. We will be handing out cards at our meetings and other events that can be given to your servers in restaurants.

Wading Bird Rookeries of the Cedar Keys NWR

The islands of the Cedar Keys National Wildlife Refuge have been important nesting grounds for many species of wading and shorebirds for a long time. The Refuge was established in 1929 due to its critical importance in providing nesting grounds. In this presentation, Doig will discuss the current state of nesting activities on Snake Key, give an update on Seahorse Key activity, and also give an overview of the artificial nesting platform for shorebirds and seabirds at Atsena Otie Key.

Florida Winter Shorebird Survey

Florida's Annual Winter Shorebird Survey starts on Friday, February 2nd, and continues through Thursday, February 8th. This week-long survey serves as the official statewide snapshot of coastal wintering shorebirds and seabirds in Florida. For the 2018 survey, FWC and partners updated the protocol and streamlined the sign-up process to make it easier to participate! The Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC)

Friday, February 16 through Monday, February 19

It's a free, fun, and easy event that engages bird watchers of all ages in counting birds to create a real-time snapshot of bird populations. Participants are asked to count birds for as little as 15 minutes (or as long as they wish) on one or more days of the four-day event and report their sightings online at birdcount.org. Anyone can take part in the Great Backyard Bird Count, from beginning bird watchers to experts, and you can participate from your backyard or anywhere in the world.

What's at Stake - I Support Spending Conservation Dollars on Parks, not Paper Clips.

Funding to protect Florida's most critical land and water resources is a top priority. With the passage of Florida's Land and Water Legacy Amendment in 2014, Floridians signaled that conservation, habitat, and watershed protection programs are a top priority. Unfortunately, in recent years, funds made available from the Land Acquisition Trust Fund have been redirected to fund state government agency operations, leaving less for essential conservation programs.

Thankfully, Senator Rob Bradley proposed to exclude operations from using this pot of conservation funding. If this measure is approved, it would leave more funding available for the core priority conservation programs.
