Cedar Key Bird Rescue Program

We have 6 new volunteers!! Over the past month, we have reached out to neighboring communities (Yankeetown and Williston) asking for assistance with transport of birds to and from Homosassa. Several people answered the request and they have agreed to meet another transporter to take the bird the rest of the way. THANK YOU and WELCOME!

Not sure why, maybe the super cold weather, but there were no rescues in January. If anyone has rescue reports or photos to submit - please send them! Even when the rescue was "unsuccessful" (e.g., if you went looking for a bird but could not find it or could not catch it), we need to keep track. A text, email, or phone call (804-305-6014) to Dr. Barry with the info about the rescue would suffice if the paper form is too inconvenient. She needs the species, type of injury, volunteers that helped, approximate amount of time spent (including transport to rehab, if any), and outcome of rescue (if known). Even if you cannot remember all details, please send anything you can remember about rescue activities. Photos are also essential to the record keeping.

Numbers to call for rescue are at the end of this newsletter and are on each page of the website.

Our Newest Project - No More Plastic Straws

We use 500 million plastic straws everyday in the United States. If we don't act now, by 2050 there will be more plastic than fish in our oceans. An estimated 71% of seabirds and 30% of turtles have been found with plastics in their stomachs. When they ingest plastic, marine life has a 50% mortality rate. At the very least, say "NO PLASTIC STRAW, PLEASE!" Get in the habit of asking for no straw when you order a beverage. Be ready to tell your server why. We will be handing out cards at our meetings and other events that can be given to your servers in restaurants.

Florida Online Trail Guide

Florida residents and visitors can now find all of their trail information in one location, thanks to a new online trail guide that boasts more than 1,300 trails. The interactive map features every known hiking, biking, paddling, equestrian, multi-use and motorized off-road trail in Florida. It was developed by the Office of Greenways and Trails (OGT) and includes 2,561 miles of hiking trails, 448 miles of biking trails, 601 miles of equestrian trails, 859 miles of motorized off-road trails, 4,962 miles of paddling trails and 1,657 miles of paved multi-use trails. Consolidating trail information that traditionally exists in dozens of locations into a single application makes it easier for Floridians and visitors to plan their outings and vacations.

Through a search engine, users can find trails near cities, towns, counties or major geographic features, or they can pan and zoom to explore trails anywhere in the state. Land trails on the map are indicated by brown lines and paddling trails by blue.



Wading Bird Rookeries of the Cedar Keys NWR

Attention Beachgoers:

Help us collect data on nesting horseshoe crabs by reporting tagged animals



If you see a tagged crab (like the ones in the photo on the left): 1) Snap a picture of the tag or record the tag # (number is on the bottom of the tag, shown

in the photo on the right). 2) Note the date, location, and general condition of the crab (alive or dead) 3) Report data using the online form at (www.fws.gov/crabtag/) or by calling 1-888-546-8587 (1-888-LIMULUS).

-DO NOT remove the tag. When recording the tag #, try to limit disturbance to the crab (try not to pick it up and if you must pick it up, NEVER pick it up by the tail).

Data goes into a national database maintained by the US Fish and Wildlife Service and ontributes to knowledge about horseshoe crab movements and population numbers

What's at Stake - Suwannee River Water Management District's Lukens Tract.

As you come into Cedar Key, you pass the Lukens Tract on both sides of SR 24 before you get to Bridge 4. It is owned by the Suwannee River Water Management District (SRWMD) and managed as a part of the Lower Suwannee and Cedar Keys National Wildlife Refuges. The public has access through the entire tract, but the section on the south side all the way to the kayak launch, requires a Special Use Authorization permit and you must stay on the 60-foot public access road while crossing the private inholdings. These tracts are great places for birding. You obtain the permit by telephoning Mr. McCook at the SRWMD at (386) 362-1001. Mr. McCook will send the permit either by mail or email. The only way to assure that this property stays accessible to the public, is to show our support by requesting a permit. The more permits requested, the more the District knows that the public wants the land to remain accessible to the public for kayaking, birding, picnicking, etc.
