For a couple of months, purple martins took advantage of the overhead utility lines and snags. It looks like we need to install some houses for them. They are a natural insect pest control and, with all the rain we had, were welcome visitors.



Cedar Key Bird Rescue Program

From January through July there were 27 attempted or successful bird rescues in Cedar Key that included 9 pelicans, 8 ospreys, 4 cormorants, and several other species. The two most frequent issues were fishing gear entanglement (8) and emaciation (6). One of the entangled birds had a foot missing because of the constriction. This is a good time to stress the need for anglers to be careful with their lines and to not cut them if you hook a bird.

This spring we added several folks in the Yankeetown/Gulf Hammock area to our ranks who are willing to act as transporters of the injured and rehabbed birds. We welcome them aboard and appreciate their help. More info on all things pertaining to the Bird Rescue Program can be obtained from Dr. Savanna Barry. Also, a limited number of gas cards are available to help defray the cost.

Entangled Bird?

If anyone has rescue reports or photos to submit - please send them! Even when the rescue was "unsuccessful" (e.g., if you went looking for a bird but could not find it or could not catch it), we need to keep track. A text, email, or phone call (804-305-6014) to Dr. Barry with the info about the rescue would suffice if the paper form is too inconvenient. She needs the species, type of injury, volunteers that helped, approximate amount of time spent (including transport to rehab, if any), and outcome of rescue (if known). Even if they cannot remember all details, please send anything they can remember about rescue activities. Photos are also essential to the record keeping



Too Much Rain

The dry season never came this spring. As a result, the normal rain events of summer flooded much of the Lower Suwannee National Wildlife Refuge. Rainfall patterns kept the entire Suwannee watershed wet all spring and into the typically wet summer. Since the Refuge is located at the very end of the watershed, the 9-mile long Nature Drive had to close for a while and the road lost a portion of the lime rock surface.

Second Annual Sunset Birding Cruise

After a month delay because of bad weather, twenty-six birders and conservationist enjoyed a sunset cruise out to Dog, Seahorse, and Snake Keys in the Cedar Keys National Wildlife Refuge. With about 15,000 birds nesting on Snake Key, it has become the substitute for Seahorse after the nest abandonment several years ago. Thanks to Doug and Barbara Maple for arranging and to Mike and Connie O'Dell for the excellent experience on their Tidewater Tours boat.
