Living Shorelines Projects

As a part of the living shorelines projects, there are 3 weeks of volunteer events for students, faculty, and the community to get involved with. Currently, we have set aside January 28-30, February 12-14, and March 10-12 for living shoreline volunteer days in Cedar Key. Each day would be roughly 4 hours of work with volunteers starting off by meeting at the Nature Coast Biological Station. The type of work volunteers would be involved in includes reef outline marking, oyster sill construction, marsh transplants, and more. With guidance from Dr. Jason Fischer, Program Manager-birds at Disney's Animal Kingdom, and a grant from Audubon Florida, the Cedar Keys Audubon's goal to establish a breeding population with two starter complex is advancing. Much appreciation to Scott Wright for taking on this project and getting the two complexes installed. One can be seen next to the hardware store on First Street and the other at Scott's house on Hodges. 
